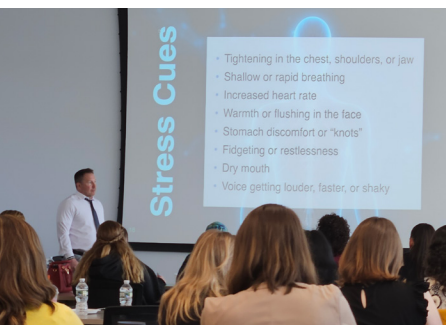

Why Requests for Qualifications (RFQs) Often Beat Requests for Proposals (RFPs) for Professional Services



When procuring professional services—such as engineering, architecture, consulting, or legal support—many organizations default to a traditional Request for Proposals (RFP). A RFP is best used when scope, outcomes, and constraints are already well-defined, and you need to compare detailed approaches, methodologies, and pricing to select the best overall value—not just the most qualified firm—especially for one-time, competitively bid projects.

Yet a Request for Qualifications (RFQ or RFQ) is often a better fit, especially when project scope is evolving or highly technical.

An RFQ focuses first on “who” is best qualified, rather than “how” they will execute a fully defined scope. This shift brings several benefits.

First, it **improves quality and risk management**. By emphasizing credentials, relevant experience, key personnel, and past performance, an RFQ helps you shortlist firms that have successfully delivered similar work. You reduce the risk of selecting a low-cost but unqualified provider and improve the likelihood of a successful outcome.

Second, it **reduces wasted effort**—for both your organization and the market. Instead of evaluating lengthy, speculative proposals from dozens of firms, you assess concise qualifications packages. Shortlisted firms then collaborate with you to refine scope, approach, and pricing, leading to more tailored, realistic proposals.

Third, **RFQs support better long-term partnerships**. The process encourages dialogue around capabilities, capacity, and fit, rather than one-off transactional bids. This is especially valuable for multi-year, on-call, or indefinite delivery contracts.

Finally, **RFQs are often more defensible and transparent**. Selection criteria tied to experience and competence are easier to document, explain, and audit than subjective proposal narratives.

City of Meriden CT Public Works and Engineering Department Earns APWA Accreditation

The NEAPWA chapter celebrates the City of Meriden Public Works and Engineering Department for earning APWA Accreditation, a major professional achievement that recognizes excellence in public works management and service delivery.

Accreditation is the mark of professionalism, indicating a public works agency has made the commitment to continuous improvement in the delivery of public works operations and services in the community it serves. Accreditation recognizes an agency's policies, procedures, and practices, which have been evaluated against nationally recognized management practices determined to be appropriate for that specific agency. A team of evaluators consisting of experienced public works professionals reviewed 312 practices to confirm the department's compliance with internationally recognized management practices applicable to the agency's operations and responsibilities.

Meriden became accredited in fall 2025 after about one year of work, joining a small group of only 226 accredited agencies in North America, six in the New England Chapter and just the second accredited agency in Connecticut.

The Chapter extends its congratulations to Public Works Director John Lawlor, Accreditation Manager Mark Austin, the public works team, City Manager Brian P. Daniels, the City Council, and all other staff members who contributed to this accomplishment.

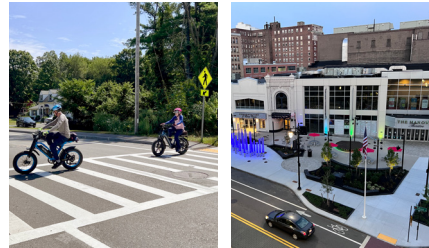

The Norton/Mansfield Rail Trail Extension improved regional connectivity by extending a multi-use path along a former railroad corridor between Mansfield and Norton. The project included safety measures, enhanced roadway crossings, and accessibility improvements that support recreation, alternative transportation, and sustainable mobility.

These awards recognize not only engineering and design excellence, but also the vision and commitment of BETA and its clients to creating vibrant, connected, and resilient communities.

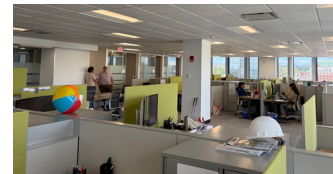

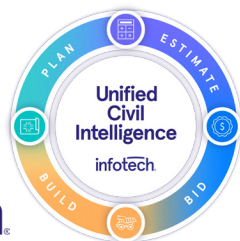
